How was the Virginia Tech Ring Committee formed?

The Class of 2000 Ring Design Committee is composed of seven student members. There are four Class officers on the committee: the

President, Male Member-at-Large, Female Member-at-Large, and Cadet Member-at-Large. These individuals, along with the other Class officers, choose a member of the Class to serve as the Ring Design Chairperson and two other Class members to also serve on the committee. They make this decision by evaluating an application and also through the person's performance in an interview. The Class officers go through the same process in choosing the Ring Dance Chairperson. The criteria for choosing these students are involvement in the university and a strong willingness to get involved in a great tradition.

THE HISTORY OF THE

VIRGINIA TECH RING

It is a time-honored tradition at Virginia Tech that members of the Sophomore Class design their Class ring. Beginning with the Class of 1914, the officers of the Sophomore Class have chosen a small committee to design their Class ring collection. Charged with the task of combining the past as well as the future into a single unifying symbol, the end result continues to be the spirit of the Class combined with the pride of the university.

Since 1911, the university's ring program has developed into one of the finest and most prestigious in the nation. Virginia Tech is one of a handful of schools which designs a traditional Class ring each year. It is distinctive from other schools as it is the only program to redesign an entire collection from initial concept to final completion. The Virginia Tech ring account is one of the most sought after accounts in the country today.

Each year, symbols have been incorporated into the traditional ring, dating back as far as 1914. The first ring featured a pair of eagles, symbolizing strength and freedom. Since then, every ring has had at least one eagle on its shank, earning the name of "The Screaming Eagle." Each Class chooses to include symbols reflecting Tech's military heritage, campus buildings, and the Class logo and motto.

This year's collection is no exception. The thought that has gone into its design will always

be remembered because it retains the attention to detail that has represented the Virginia Tech collections of the past.



To commemorate the Ring Tradition, the Virginia Tech Class of 1935 held the first Ring Dance in March of its Junior year. Along with the design of the Class ring, Ring Dance Weekend has become a time-honored tradition at Virginia Tech. The Class of 2000 will proudly become the sixty-sixth class of Virginia Tech to contribute to this spectacular program.

Upon entering the dance, each couple will receive a pair of ribbons in the Class colors. The lady will wear her date's ring on her wrist with the darker ribbon, and the gentleman will wear his date's ring on his wrist with the lighter ribbon. When the time comes for the Ring Presentation, the Corps of Cadets will march into the ballroom and form the shape of the Class year. As each couple exchanges rings, "Moonlight and VPI," written specially for the Ring Dance by composer Fred Waring and lyricist Charles Gaynor, will be played. As the clock strikes midnight, the evening

will end with an elaborate fireworks display on the Drillfield and the playing of "Silvertaps."

We invite you to take part in the entire ring program and hope you will enjoy all of the festivities planned as the Class of 2000 continues this everlasting Virginia Tech tradition.

COLONEL

HARRY DOWNING TEMPLE

I recently had a chance to speak with Col. Harry Downing Temple about the Virginia Tech Ring Tradition. Colonel Temple is an expert on the tradition in more ways than one. First, he served on the Ring Design Committee as a sophomore in 1932. The following year he served on the miniature ring committee that was responsible for designing a woman's ring to be given to the object of a cadet's affection. Colonel Temple is also the unofficial Virginia Tech historian and has undertaken a seemingly overwhelming task of recording the day-to-day history of Virginia Tech from its conception through the World War II era. As a part of this history, he records the birth of the ring tradition that carries on essentially unchanged today.


Colonel Temple told me about his experience on the Ring Design Committee. He and a handful of other classmates got together and began brainstorming ideas for symbols they would like to see on their Class ring. At that time, icons like Burruss Hall and the Pylons, which are common on today's rings, did not yet exist. When they knew what they wanted, they reviewed proposals from six ring companies. Once they selected the company, they worked one-on-one with artists to achieve a finished product of which everyone could be proud. He explained each item on the sides of his ring. Most of them dealt with Corps and military imagery because the Corps of Cadets was still mandatory for a student's first two years.

Near the end of our conversation, I asked Col. Temple one last question. I was curious about the number of rings sold among his classmates in the class of 1934. It seemed to me that a college student, during the Depression, could not justify spending hard earned money on a piece of jewelry. His response caught me by surprise. "I can't think of a single boy in my Class who didn't order a ring." He said that everyone worked, saved, or borrowed to get the thirty-five dollars which covered the full price of the ring. He reflected on the emotional significance of having a ring and the purpose it served as a symbol of pride, dedication, and accomplishment.

- 1. Pay in full Receive \$10 discount when you pay in full at time of order.
- 2. Time Payment Leave at least a \$75 deposit on your MasterCard, Visa, American Express or Discover when you place your order. The remaining balance is then divided into equal payments (up to eight) and will be charged at 30 day intervals.
- 3. Monthly Installment Plan Leave a \$50 deposit when you place your order. Pay for your ring in 5 monthly installments. Ring will be processed upon receipt of fourth payment. No interest charged on balance due.
- 4. C.O.D. Leave a deposit when you place your order and pay the balance due when the ring arrives.




Traditional Ring Class Side

Traditional Bezel






Traditional Ring University Side



The Virginia Tech ring is created through special artistry, craftsmanship, and many hours of diligent effort. Your ring will be among the most personal and meaningful pieces of jewelry you will ever own. Therefore, ArtCarved wants to provide you with the most complete warranty commitment for a lifetime of satisfaction.

- A. Lengths and conditions of guarantee regarding defects in material and workmanship.

 The rings are warranted to be free of defect in workmanship and materials.
- B. Length and scope of guarantee regarding stones and stone decorations.

 Any damaged simulated stone will he replaced at no charge regardless of the cause of damage.
- C. Conditions and associated charges for ring resizing and ring adjustments. The ring will he resized at any time at no charge.
- D. Conditions and associated charges for replacement of damaged rings.

 Any damaged encrusted stone will he replaced at no charge regardless of cause of damage.
- E. Conditions and associated charges for ordering additional rings.

 Additional rings may be ordered at any time. After December 31, 2000, the rings may be ordered at the prevailing price at time of order. Prevailing price will be determined according to cost of gold and stones at the time of ordering.
- F. Conditions and associated charges for changes in academic college destination.

 A classmate who changes colleges at Virginia Tech after a ring is purchased may return the ring to be remade with proper designation at no charge.
- G. Refund policy for rings returned for students who fail to graduate with the class designated on the ring.

 A classmate who fails to graduate with your Class may return the ring for a full refund less class dues.
- H. Responsibility and procedures for resolving disputes regarding the validity of warranty clauses.

 Disputes as to the validity of the warranty clauses will be resolved by the Ring Committee. With ArtCarved's philosophy that the customer is always right, such arbitration by the Committee should never be necessary.
- Conditions and associated charges for restoring ring finish.
 Should a classmate not be totally satisfied with his or her original choice of finish, refinishing would be completed at no charge.
- J. Conditions on how repairs are made, who to contact, and how shipping rates are handled.

 Prior to graduation of your Class, service dates will be established to handle any adjustments. All shipping, handling and insurance costs will be the responsibility of ArtCarved during these sessions.
